What is GLYPHICONS Label

Label is a single, size-specific font, made to complement your icons, signs, illustrations, infographic, etc.

It is crafted for optimal use at a default size of 10 pt or its multiples!

With each glyph precisely aligned and kerned on the grid, it maintains high sharpness while keeping everything smooth and rounded.

It's a fun font and has a certain almost "comic" quality; it's basically a pixel font, only rounded.



What GLYPHICONS Label is not

Label is not a traditional typeface and shouldn't be used for any longer text.

It is also not intended to be used in all sizes, only 10 pt or its multiples!

Due to its specific purpose and unique "pixel grid" kerning, font favors alignment to the pixel grid and sharpness over traditional optical balance between characters, so in certain cases it might be necessary to adjust spaces between individual glyphs manually, especially in bigger sizes than 10 pt.
